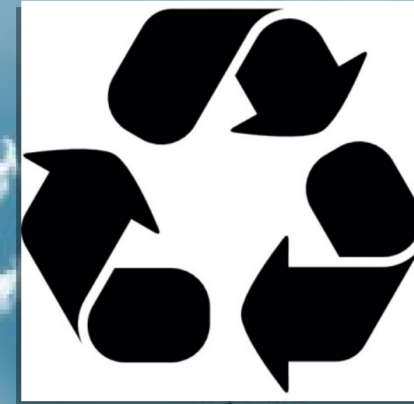




DO NOT throw your cellphone

Your mobile phone contains "environmentally friendly equipment and circuits"



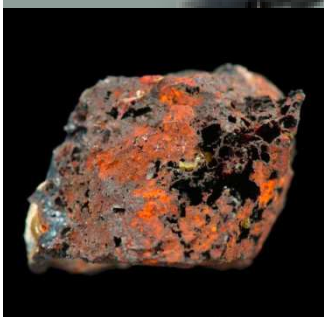
The materials used to make a cell phone are in part very difficult to obtain, in fact many companies exploit in an incognito manner the child labor to procure such materials

HealthyStuff has literally 'dissected' 36 different models, concluding that all cell phones that are analyzed contain at least one of the five most dangerous substances, including bromine, chlorine, lead, mercury and cadmium.

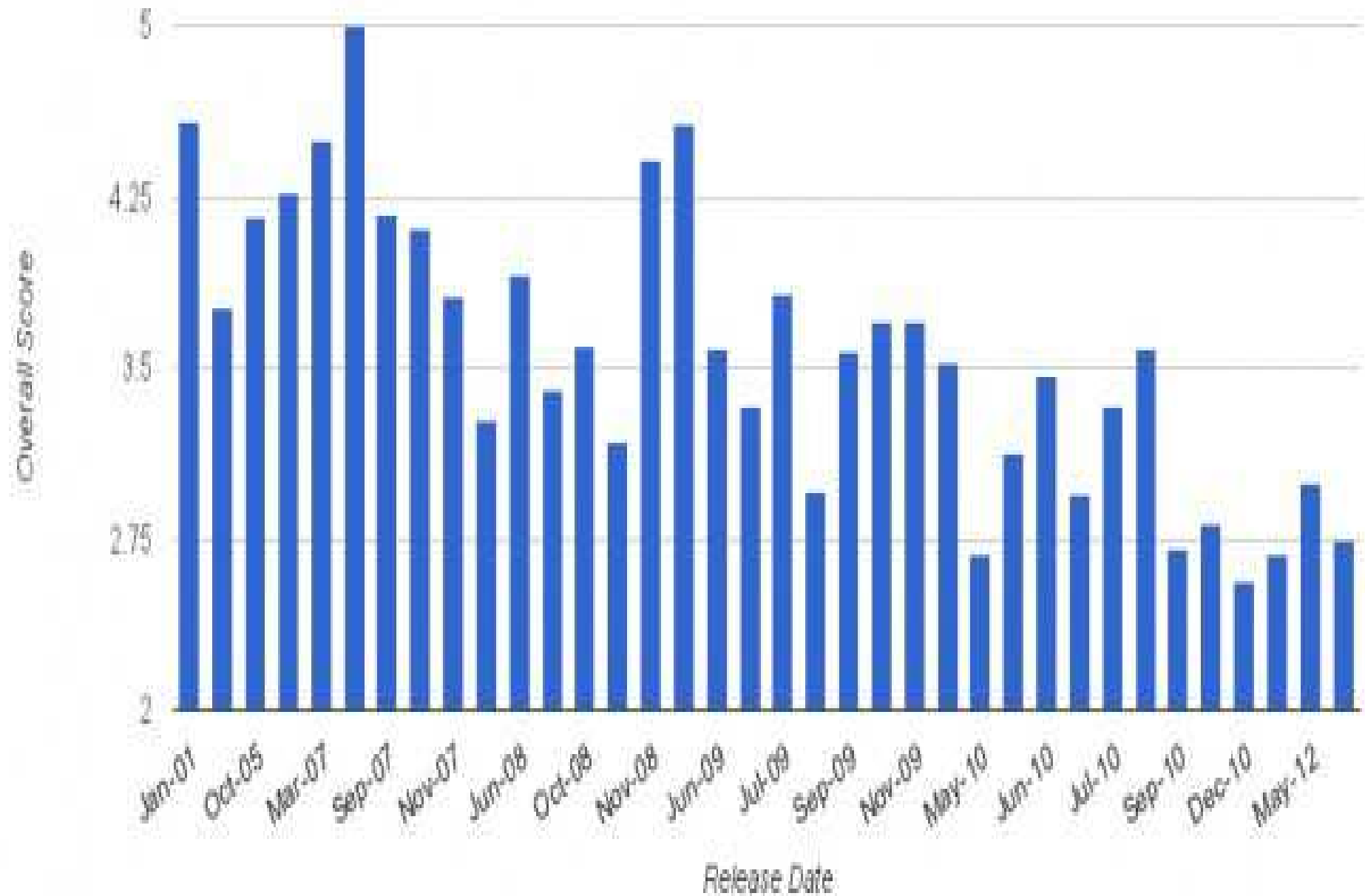
